At a time when I needed it most, I stumbled upon the writings of Barbara Brown Taylor, and I saw in her books some of my own spiritual journey. In Part Three of my four-part series of sermons, based on Taylor's four most recent books, we'll explore Learning to Walk in the Dark which asks: How do we cope when we can no longer see the light in our lives? She helps us understand that journeying in darkness, dealing with the things that scares us, often prevents us from seeing the light in our own lives. Over the last two years, we have all been forced to confront the things that scare us. And, if you in turn, will commit to sharing a service with us about your spiritual journey, I have one of her books for you.

UUCOM Members and Friends Survey

It is the time of year to update our Members and Friends Directory for 2022. This year we are combining our directory update with the collection of additional demographic data to limit the amount of work for the congregation.

A more robust demographic collection process had been discussed by the Board for both internal UUCOM use and for the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), as they request demographic data from congregations as part of their annual UUA certification. To streamline this process in the future we are gathering this information alongside the UUMidland Congregational Directory update.

To facilitate this effort, a voluntary survey has been created to collect the demographic data and directory update. All demographic responses you provide will remain confidential. Your data will not be reported beyond the aggregate (combined data from all responses) congregational data without permission.

You will also be asked to update a directory listing for the 2022 Members and Friends Directory if applicable. Lastly a new online Directory request page is available (https://bit.ly/3nAT2m0) if you would like a copy of

the current or future directory.

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Church In-Person Service Reopening

On Sunday, October 24, 2021 we will partially reopen the building for Sunday services. The board and the COVID Team gave much thought to the rules which we must all abide by as a way to properly care for each other and reduce the possibility of spreading the virus. Please read them carefully and be prepared to follow them.

We will also continue to broadcast our services over Zoom. We expect that Zoom will become a permanent part of our services so that people who cannot attend in person will be able to join us online.

THE RULES

- Masks that cover the mouth and nose will be required for all participants (age 2 years and up). The
 exception to this will be speakers at the pulpit who stand behind the shield and individuals with
 medical issues that prevent mask usage.
- 2. All attendees must maintain 6 foot social distance. Exceptions only will be made for family groups.
- 3. Attendance will be taken for contact-tracing purposes.
- 4. Temperatures will be taken. All participants must register at 100 degrees Fahrenheit or below to be allowed entry.
- 5. Please use only the marked doors for entry and exit from the building.
- Socializing areas will take place in outdoor spaces only (either under the front tree or in the south garden which will be accessible through the west gate only). The fellowship hall will not be open for socializing.
- 7. Though the sanctuary will be open, its capacity will be limited to 30 people. Should there be an overflow, we may use the fellowship hall for a small number of people. The only other areas open to all will be the bathrooms. The classrooms, kitchen, storage closets, library and offices will only be accessible to specifically authorized individuals.
- 8. There will be no congregational singing.

Just like the rest of you, the Board is looking forward to the day when we can return to what was our normal building use before the pandemic. We sincerely hope that day will be very soon. We will keep you informed. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact any board member.


January Share the Plate

- Donate to support Texans seeking abortions. WPCR Workshops

As the United States enters a new chapter in its history and, in the words of Youth Poet Laureate Amanda Gorman, "we lift our gazes not to what stands between us but what stands before us," White People Challenging Racism (WPCR): Moving From Talk to Action continues to awaken racial awareness and spur participants into action.

In a time of unprecedented crises, WPCR is meeting the moment. More workshops are being offered in more communities than ever before. We are continuously updating our curriculum to reflect events taking place in the U.S. WPCR alumni continue to carry out action plans to confront, challenge and dismantle racism wherever they live, work, worship, and volunteer. Imagine the impact we can have if everyone who takes WPCR implements their action plan!

UUA Common Read: Defund Fear

The 2021–2022 UU Common Read is <u>Defund Fear: Safety Without Policing, Prisons, and Punishment</u> by Zach Norris, published by Beacon Press. The Common Read builds community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared platform for reflection and a shared focus for action. Further, a Common Read can take us on a powerful faith journey as we explore—individually and together—what it means to be human and accountable in a pain-filled world.

In *Defund Fear*, Community leader and lawyer Zach Norris shifts the conversation about public safety away from fear and punishment and toward growth and support systems for our families and communities. Norris explores what has gone wrong, why, and who has been most impacted by repressive and racist policing systems. He offers a blueprint for public safety that holds people accountable while still holding them in community. As Unitarian Universalists, the matters raised in *Defund Fear* invite us to respond to public safety in the U.S. today through a lens of faith. We urge you to grapple theologically with big, tough questions about who we are and the meaning and purposes of our lives. For your care, for your growth, and for the care and growth of others in your community with whom you will discuss *Defund Fear*, it is strongly recommended that you enter this book with this **series of questions** by your side.

We expect by the end of this calendar year we'll be ready to announce a menu of resources so that congregations can start scheduling their Common Reads. Anticipate a range of resources geared toward identity-based groups and geographically dispersed cohorts as well as a traditional discussion guide for a Common Read session that any UU faith community can use. This will be a one-hour class at 7 PM EST on 3rd Sundays starting Feb 20, 2022


In this particular book group you and your chapter can participate in three ways:
