Minister's Musings

One of the things that I love about our church is that we are pretty laid-back. Growing up at All Saints Lutheran Church in Worthington Ohio, I would have never DREAMED of "talking back" to Pastor Ullery on the pulpit. Which is a shame really, because if there's a Lutheran pastor from those days who could take it, it was PU (our pet name for our beloved minister). Nevertheless, back then Sundays at ASLC was what we typically think of when we hear the word church: everyone sitting and listening to the minister, with some singing and reciting from the congregation when required.



But not at UUCOM!

There are many reasons for this - I think there are probably many UU churches out there with worship services that look more like my All Saints days versus what we share here. My point is that I love the community we have and the fact that we can "roll with" a massive influx of out of town visitors, like the ones we had on December 17.

In case you missed it, the service was even more lively than usual. It was incredibly joyful and meaningful for me to have so many of my family members on hand, including my mom, brother and his family plus two aunts and an uncle, all of whom traveled from all over the US to see me in *The Sound of Music*. Their presence at both events meant the world to me - some of these visitors were a complete surprise.

I'll never forget sitting in our living room and taking in the group when Zach leaned over to ask if I was nervous about the show that night. While there was a bit of that, I was mostly excited. However, the nerves were definitely kicking in when I thought about them all coming to church the next day.

As blessed and lucky as I am to have a loving supportive family, we are the only Jebsen branch of the tree that identifies as UU. I was uncertain and even scared of what they might think of the service. Turns out they were all very into it and the conversations that I had with my uncle and the rest of the group afterward, not to mention the long hugs I got from my sister in law who was clearly moved are all part of a long list of unforgettable memories from that weekend.



It is easy to feel helpless in the face of relentless attacks - this is a small action we can take in support of reproductive rights!





Body Prayer

It is important is to take time to be quiet, to be still,

so we can be in touch with the deepest and best part of ourselves—our inner voice—often called prayer or meditation.

I invite you to join in a body prayer.

We begin with our hands in front of us in the prayer pose: "I am still"

We place our hands over our hearts: "I am loved."

We place our hands cupped in front of us: "I can receive."

We extend our hands out in front of us: "I can give."

We lift our hands high over our heads: "I am open to the Spirit of Life."

We bring our hands cupped in front of us again: "I receive these gifts."

And returning to our stillness,

we bring our hands together again in the prayer pose: "I am still."

[repeat three times and end with a slow bow as a closing.]

Join us for the SouthWest UU Women annual conference in Navasota, TX.


