January 10 Healed by Conflict by Rev. Julie Lombard

Hear how this Unitarian Universalist Church transformed themselves, their culture, and the wider world by facing conflict head on and learn how it lead them to say: We believe that open conversation and dealing directly with conflict are essential for a healthy church. Toward that end, Restorative

Circles™ are a method for responding to conflict between and among members of our church community. Come, hear their story.

January 27 Change is Coming by Rev. Julie Lombard

Justice looks beautiful in the young face of a teen, Greta Thunberg of Sweden, as she sits next to UN Secretary General António Guterres at the COP24 in Poland to let them know "that our political leaders have failed us, because we are facing an existential threat and there's no time to continue down this road of madness." Hear the stern rebuke she offered on behalf of the world's youth climate movement to the adult diplomats, executives, and elected leaders gathered by telling them she was not there asking for help or demanding they



comply with demands but she was there to let them know that new political realities and a renewable energy transformation are coming whether they like it or not. Hear the story of how the young plan to guide us forward to a greener reality.

January 24 Cultivating Home



Social Action Committee

The pandemic has inspired in many of us a renewed appreciation for our homes as a place of safety and retreat. Most of us have been lucky enough to always have a place that shelters us from life's storms. But what about those who do not have such a safe haven? Midland/Odessa has several chronically homeless residents. How can we support the dignity, health, and well-being of homeless men and women in Midland?

One local nonprofit, The Field's Edge, seeks an answer to these questions by building a tiny-home community for the chronically homeless, which just broke ground in November. Founder John-Mark Echols will join us to speak about the organization.

The name of the organization is derived from Leviticus 23:22, "When you reap the harvest of your land, moreover, you shall not reap to the very corners of your field nor gather the gleaning of your harvest; you are to leave them for the needy and the alien. I am the Lord your God." John-Mark reads this verse as a charge to love and serve our homeless neighbors selflessly.

January Minister's Musings by Rev. Julie Lombard



Happy New Year! You've probably heard the saying from Martin Luther King, Jr. "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." That is what is on my mind as I think about January and our worship theme of Justice.

It makes me wonder: what is justice? Where do we draw the line? It's important to ask these questions both as individuals and as a community. Our answers may differ. How we answer them as individuals may not be in alignment with our community response. You may individually support the U.S. *Immigration and Customs Enforcement policies* when our denomination does not, same is true with law enforcement reform. Justice is a balancing act.

The Unitarian Universalist Association has a social justice brand that says that we 'Side with Love". Not long ago it was 'Standing on the Side of Love' until that statement was deemed insensitive to those who are unable to stand. We strive for inclusion, yet sometimes our words and deeds fall short.

Rather than follow a creed, we covenant to be together in right relation regardless of our position on any topic. This concept of covenant comes from our Judeo-Christian roots when our faith looked to the Bible to decide whether we could live faithfully with one another and with God, leading our ancestors to reject the rule of kings. Rather than being accountable to a superior God, we covenant with one another as equals and faith seekers. A sense of God may be part of this covenant for some people and not for others. This goes for justice, too.

You also may have noticed that UUCOM has moved into phase 1 of our Covid 19 responds which means we will be meeting only online during the current surge. The Board takes everyone's health seriously. They surveyed y'all in November to find out your personal comfort level with the pandemic, but things have changed in a short time. California has gone back into a lock down and many hospitals across our country have run out of beds. Please know that the leadership here wants to listen to you and meet your needs, but we also want to keep everyone safe. Our decision may not be the truest refection of justice, but it is one of love. Stay home. Stay safe. Mask up. Wash your hands and shrink your interactions in the wider public. Let's do all we can to stop the spread Covid 19.

As James Luther Adams reminded us, as religious liberals we freely choose to enter into relationship with one another - this is the foundation of covenant, the promise we make with one another. In the month ahead, we will explore what that promise means as we ponder justice everywhere. I invite you to think about the positions you take, the positions this faith takes, and about how the need for justice calls us to love our neighbor.





Mid-Week Event: Online Drop-In Space:




Wednesdays 2 -2:30 PM

The Field's Edge is a 501c3 Non-Profit organization in Midland, Texas focused on cultivating a permanent supportive tiny house community for the chronically homeless and disabled. The Field's Edge's vision is to build a permanent, supportive, tiny-home community for the chronically homeless in Midland, Texas. This village will

bring close to one hundred formerly homeless residents of the Permian Basin into The Field's Edge family. Every detail of the design is centered on building relationships. People who have never experienced homelessness will be called to live in the village. They will live alongside men and women who have spent most of their lives on the street. The gifts and talents of our residents will be developed into microenterprises. enabling them to earn a dignified income. Partnerships are being forged with mental and physical health care providers to give residents the care they need. The Field's Edge will be a permanent place to call home, a place for neighbors to walk alongside each other for life. The driving force behind The Field's Edge is a firm belief that every man, woman, and child are created in the image of God, designed to stir, encourage, and build one another up. The ultimate goal of this ministry is to bring all people together into a lifestyle of true homemaking in an increasingly homeless world. Four walls and a roof do not make a home. 2021 Drop-ins: Small Group Ministry

Small Group Ministry is a vital part of many Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations across America. In other churches they are called Chalice Circle or Covenant Groups. Groups of 8-10 people meet regularly, usually monthly, to reflect on and discuss significant life topics.

Small groups are great places to get to know other people and to get to know your better, too. Over time, participants build deep connections with one another, with the congregation and with the sacred.

Discussion topics are provided. The ones we'll use for Drop-ins will reflect our UU Principles and Purposes. The conversations we'll have will be respectful and caring and they'll lead to greater understanding of our UU values. In each session, facilitated by our minister, all participants have opportunity to share their perspectives, tell their stories, and listen deeply. The time together is structured: groups begin with a chalice lighting, centering readings, and some questions before the sharing begins.

Maybe you just signed the membership book or did that long ago, or not at all-come and try it on and see how small group ministry fits for you. 

Common Read 2020-21: Breathe by Imani Perry

The UUA is pleased to announce that <u>Breathe: A Letter to My Sons</u> by Imani Perry (Beacon Press, 2019) is the new Common Read.

Emotionally raw and deeply reflective, Imani Perry issues a challenge to society to see Black children as deserving of humanity. She admits fear and frustration for her African American sons in a society that is increasingly racist and at times seems irredeemable. However, as a mother, feminist, writer, and intellectual, Perry offers an unfettered expression of love—finding beauty and possibility in life—and she exhorts her children and their peers to find the courage to chart their own paths and find steady footing and inspiration in Black tradition. The New York Times calls Breathe "an elixir of history, ancestry and compassion, which, together, become instruction…a parent's unflinching demand, born of inherited trauma and love, for her children's right simply to be possible."



Breathe offers a broader meditation on race, gender, and the meaning of a life well lived and is also an unforgettable lesson in Black resistance and resilience.

At this moment in time, we are in the midst of a historic national reckoning with what it means to live as a Black or Brown American and systems of institutional racism that have been operating to control, traumatize, and oppress people of color since our country's founding. As our President, Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, has written, "It matters that we support the uprisings whose goal is the liberation of Black people and communities who for too long have been crushed by white supremacy, militarism, and capitalism. We must find the sources within ourselves to give us courage in this moment." In choosing Breathe as the 2020-2021 Common Read, our hope is that it nurtures this necessary courage.
