There have been many challenges we faced as we learned how to navigate church in the time of Covid. Our minister, Rev. Julie Lombard, was a hard working guide and leader as she ministered to our members and helped us all stay connected via Zoom church. I would like to offer my gratitude to her for her service to us and wishes for her continued joy in ministry.

We had a good turnout for our spring congregational meeting and great presentations by all involved. As you can see, we voted on many topics of interest that will guide us in the coming year.

On May 16, our church made several important decisions, including:

- Voting in two new investment committee members Bill Rutter and Tim Jebsen.
- Voting to adopt a "lay-led plus" ministerial structure and budget.
 - This means that our lay members will lead the church and invite speakers to lead services a couple of times a month.

- Voting to adopt the 8th Principle as a congregation.






2021 UUA General Assembly

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Participants worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through democratic process. Anyone June attend; congregations must certify annually to have voting delegates

The UUA Board of Trustees has passed a resolution making the 2021 UUA General Assembly a 100% virtual event. Let's reach record-breaking attendance **June 23-27**, **2021!**

Circle 'Round for Justice • Healing • Courage is the theme for General Assembly 2021. GA is a time to circle 'round in community. We circle 'round in care and healing; for liberation and justice; and for love and courage.

Why Virtual General Assembly?

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles. That remains true even when we cannot gather physically. Last year, GA had more than 4,900 registered attendees






participate from remote locations around the world. Although we give up the face-to-face interaction and hugs that are prevalent when we meet in-person, we retain our dedication to community and make our experience more accessible and more environmentally sustainable.

Rolling Ridge Spring on-line retreats

We live in troubling times as the divisions of race and gender grow deeper. At Rolling Ridge, we believe that to build bridges of understanding, we must take time to listen to the experiences of others.



Beginning in May, we are launching "Voices and Stories" as a new ONLINE series that uses historical education and contemplative listening to open hearts and minds to the events that have shaped American society today.

In June, Jackie Trotter Dove will facilitate our second "Voices and Stories" session on Tuesday, June 14th by introducing us to <u>Juneteenth</u> (short for "June Nineteenth") which marks the day when federal troops arrived in Galveston, Texas in 1865 to take control of the state and **ensure that all enslaved people be freed**. The troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. **Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States** and is considered the longest-running

African American holiday.

The 1982 Murder of Vincent Chin, who died on June 23rd, will be our third in this initial "Voices and Stories" series. The recent rise in violence against Asian Americans is reviving the story of Vincent Chin, a Chinese man beaten to death in Detroit by two white men who never spent a day in prison. This case of injustice for the Asian community ignited a movement in Civil Rights history that many people don't know about.

We have all witnessed the recent abhorrent events in our nation's Capitol where underlying tensions and unresolved conflict escalated into mob violence. Sadly, conflict does not confine itself to the political realm. Conflict is also inevitable in the church. Even if your church is not experiencing conflict now, it very likely will at some point in the future. Be prepared when conflict does arise to transform something negative into a positive opportunity for growth and reconciliation.
