Minister's Musings

One of my favorite sermons so far was an exploration of spring celebrations where we explored traditions like Songkran Water Festival, Nowruz and Holi. As the summer solstice draws near, I've found myself researching some of the many ways this day is celebrated and I thought you might be interested as well.

Scandinavian countries have variations of what we call Midsummer: Sweden has Midsommar, Finland: Juhannus, Norway: Jonsok or Sankthansaften, and Denmark has Sankt Hans Aften. Current day festivities are not always on the exact date of the solstice so that people



can enjoy the holiday over a weekend. (Sort of like what we've done with Memorial and Labor Day). You can find Midsummer celebrations in other countries as well, but these are the countries most well known for this way of celebrating summer that include rituals and traditions from preChristian times like bonfires, decorating with flowers and plants. Modern Midsummer traditions include meals of beer, pickled herring and boiled new potatoes with chives or fresh dill and sour cream as well as wearing flower wreaths.

Bonfires are also a part of the celebrations in Austria's region of Tyrol. Since the Middle Ages, locals have created massive bonfires on top of many of the mountains as the sky goes dark on the longest day of the year. These fires turn the mountaintops into beacons and cast a mystical effect across the whole mountainous region.

The same can be said for the Feast of St. Joan in Barcelona. Across the city, bonfires and fireworks are lit in honor of the start of summer. The night before one of the most important feast days for Catalans is dedicated to celebrations including parties, beach bonfires and music. The fireworks set off in the streets were originally thought to ward off evil spirits. The following day is a quiet one - a public holiday in Catalonia - dedicated to feasting with friends and family.

From bonfires to boats.... In China, one of the biggest summer celebrations is the Dragon Boat Festival that commemorates the life and death of Qu Yuan, a famous Chinese scholar.It's been celebrated for over 2,000 years and as of 2008, it is a public holiday. A key part of the festival is the famous dragon boat races. These boats can be anywhere from 40 to 100 feet long and sit 80 rowers. The races symbolize bringing the dragons to life and laying them to rest after the race finishes.

I hope you enjoyed learning a bit about how others celebrate the summer. I also hope yours is filled with fun with friends and family and plenty of Sundays at UUCOM!
