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March Minister's Musings

Dear members and friends of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Midland,

I am writing to let you know that after five years as your minister, I have decided to step down from my position in June. My last Sunday in the pulpit will be June 7, 2020. My last day will be June 10, 2020.

Friends, I am so grateful to be your minister. I have felt deeply honored to be invited into your lives, to share in your joys and sorrows, and to accompany you through significant life transitions. I feel real grief about having to say goodbye to all of you. I love being your minister! I love being together on Sundays. I love talking with you about your ideas and your hopes, your pains and your passions. I love watching the children in our classes and services grow and learn. I love working with our committed staff and exceptional lay leaders.

I'm leaving because, for about ten years, my vocation has been primary in my family's life. It is time for us to shift focus to my spouse's career. My family and I are moving to Albuquerque where Ethan will be better able to find work in his field.



In the coming weeks, the Board will share with you a road map for ministerial transition. The Unitarian Universalist Association is prepared to support UUCOM through this transition.

I will be sharing with prospective ministers my glowing review of UUCOM. This is a church where many ministers would be happy and fulfilled. This is a healthy church with caring and committed leaders. This is a church that values professional ministry and treats its minister well. This is a church that has been growing and deepening in so many significant ways and is well positioned to launch into its next chapter of even greater impact.

As I will preach about on Sunday, March 1st (the sermon will be on our blog soon), during any change or ending in our lives, it is important to be intentional about the emotional and spiritual tasks required for a "good ending." Properly processing the various feelings and needs of an ending allow a congregation to move into its next chapter with power and promise.

This Sunday will be the fifth in a new series for our lay-led Sundays that features responses from many of our members and friends to this open-ended question.


11:00 AM Religious Education: Henry Hikes to Fitchburg.

March Share the Plate

We will share ½ of all cash donations with this March's Share the Plate recipient: Fund Texas Choice. Fund Texas Choice helps Texans equitably access abortion through safe, confidential, and comprehensive travel services and practical support.



As abortion procedures in Texas last a minimum of 2 days due to the State's mandatory 24-hour waiting period and longer appointments can last a week. So, they provide two primary services to those who qualify:

- Accommodation: Any person driving several hours to an abortion clinic needs a place to stay before and after their procedure.
- Transportation: If you don't have a car, they provide bus tickets or plane tickets to the nearest clinic that can help you, in any state. If you own a car or can borrow one, they work with clinics to offset fuel costs.

The Holocaust: A Personal Journey. A Rabbi's visit to Warsaw and Auschwitz. Presentation by Rabbi Jordan Parr

Rabbi Jordan Parr is currently the spiritual leader of Temple Beth El in Odessa, TX. Rabbi Parr is a proud graduate of the University of Michigan and was later ordained at Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, OH. Prior to assuming this part-time pulpit, Rabbi Parr led congregations in Jackson, TN, Plano, TX and Augusta, GA. He also served as the Associate Rabbi at Temple Shalom in Dallas. He is recognized as a leader in the fields of Jewish Education, Medical Ethics and the relationship of Judaism to baseball. When not at his pulpit, Rabbi Parr works as an Inside Sales Representative at the Richardson, TX hub of State Farm Insurance Company. He is also an Adjunct Professor of Jewish Studies at the University of North Texas, having taught at the college level for over a decade. Rabbi Parr is married to the lovely Cynthia and has two daughters, Rebecca and Sarah, and recently welcomed Sarah's husband, Sam, to the family – who emigrated to the United States with his family from the former Soviet Union as a young boy.



Seeing all of these happy busy workers reminded me of the very first time I was exposed to a bee farm in Washington state, where I am from. ...These bees worked together so flawlessly because they all had one common love, their HOME.

We all witness our busy workers of this church every week. Working toward making our home the best it can be.

Coming into the church I was unaware of how it was run. I felt intimidated and well left out. I knew I wanted to help from day one, but how exactly? Finally I asked someone what I could do to help. They quickly replied "well help with whatever needs to be done." Surprised by their simple and concise answer, I thought, "wow, they're absolutely right but I don't want to over step with ignorance." I frequently held back on helping around here in fear of stepping on someone's toes. I heard my Nana's wise words in my mind replying, "do not make decisions based on fear, make them based on love."

During a Sunday morning service Reverend Emily was touching on service work for the church. She said something that set off an explosion of inspiration inside of me. She said, "The work does not belong to me as the minister. This church belongs to its members."

This struck an "ah hah" moment inside of my spirit. I reflected on her message that week, amazed at how off my perception truly was. I understood that just as I take pride in caring for my family and my home, the church is my home and the members are my family.

Keep Midland Beautiful Trash Pick-Up



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
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What's Happening at UUCOM
