Minister's Musings

While making plans for the services I'll lead in October, I was struck by the fact that death is a throughline for them all. I guess that's not entirely surprising with the arrival of autumn and with Halloween right around the corner. A glimpse of my TV viewing history and podcast feed and one might notice that death is a throughline there as well. (I fully admit to being a sucker for a good true crime documentary!) While some might be tempted to view all this as a sign that I am bound by a morbid curiosity, it's my humble opinion that this is a superficial analysis.



We all must face death and that's a terrifying prospect, especially in the US where there is a tendency to not speak of it beyond a tragic headline or in the hushed tones of the news of a loved one's passing. Unfortunately, I think this only serves to fuel that fear which can lead to avoiding planning for it, making difficult times even worse. In recent experience, my family has benefitted from having those tough conversations. By facing death and having honest, open discussions, we could allow our final moments with loved ones to be the best possible.

Perhaps this difficult topic is at the forefront of my mind because I've just recently become fascinated with *The Sandman* series on Netflix. It's based on the fantasy/horror graphic novel that tells the story of a powerful being who controls all dreams and nightmares. On his journey, we are introduced to some of his "siblings" who include Desire, Despair and my personal favorite, Death. The brilliant portrayal by Kirby Howell-Baptiste is utterly charming. This is no ghoul. She is firm yet compassionate and gentle as she ushers people to "the other side."

I hope to see you at 3301 Neely as we break taboos to explore this important, scary, dare I say, life affirming topic together.
